FAITH FORMATION

THE ROCK OF THE CHURCH

In the Gospel Reading (Matthew 16:13-20), Christ tells Peter that the rock on which he will found his church is exactly, Peter. The gates of hell will not prevail against him or against the church which is built on this rock. This seems a deeply comforting thought.

The problem is that it so often looks as if the gates of hell have prevailed against Christ's church. The problem actually begins with Peter. The apostle who is the rock of the Church betrayed the Lord he loved in Jesus' worst need. A betrayal like that seems to have something hellish about it, doesn't it?

In fact, wasn't Peter's betrayal of Christ just like the betrayal of Judas? But the Gospels say that Satan entered into Judas before Judas betrayed Christ (John 13:27). There is something hellish about the betrayal of Judas, then. Why not think that the gates of hell prevailed against Peter too?

What is left of that deeply comforting thought about Christ's Church and the rock that it is founded on being safe from Hell?

But there is a difference between Judas and Peter. It is not that Peter repented and Judas didn't. The Gospels say that Judas repented, too (Matthew 27:3). Rather, the difference is this. When Judas saw the sin of his betrayal for what it was, he killed himself. He threw himself away as irredeemable. Peter came back to Christ. He cleaved to the Lord he loved even in the face of his own brokenness.

And that is why Peter is the rock on which the Church is founded. The Church is not a collection of the sinless, and it was not meant to be. The Church was founded on Peter, who loved, and sinned, and held on to the Lord anyway.

The gates of Hell cannot prevail against this kind of love. This is a deeply comforting thought.

ARCHDIOCESEAN NEWS

STORM HEAVEN WITH PRAYERS

In his most recent update to priests on the status of church reopenings, Archbishop Salvatore Cordileone asked them to help their parishioners engage in focused prayer and penance as we endure all of the difficult conditions that Coronavirus has caused.

"It is my conviction that, with all that is going on in our society at this time, we need to redouble our efforts on the spiritual level. In particular, in addition to adoration, we have to reclaim an authentic and serious spirit of fasting. Fasting has traditionally been understood to mean no more than one meal in the course of a day. I am asking you to join me in observing Friday as a day of fast (unless your health condition cannot allow for it): please abstain from at least one meal on Fridays, and more than one if possible. Let us storm heaven with prayer and fasting for a restoration of public worship unhindered, for a swift end to this pandemic, for health care workers and researchers, and for government officials who must make very complicated decisions for the overall well-being of our communities."

ARCHBISHOP CORDILEONE AND METROPOLITAN GERASIMOS MAKE JOINT PUBLIC STATEMENTS

Cordileone Archbishop Salvatore Metropolitan Gerasimos of the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of San Francisco spoke with one voice on several recent occasions. In June, they denounced the killing of George Floyd and the ensuing civil unrest and protests. On July 31, asked Speaker of the Representatives Nancy Pelosi to support HR49, a House measure in solidarity with persecuted Coptic Orthodox Christians in Egypt. Also on July 31, they expressed dismay at the decision to convert the Hagia Sofia Cathedral in Turkey from its use as a museum to an Islamic mosque. There's only a month and a half left to stand up and be counted. The deadline to complete the Census has been shortened by 4 weeks to Sept 30 to allow enough time for the Census Bureau to report the results by Dec. 31, the Bureau's statutory deadline. A complete count for Census is at risk with the shortened deadline. It will mean fewer resources for our clients, our families, our communities and we risk losing seats in Congress - if there is an undercount. So stand up and be counted!

DOMINICAN CORNER

SOLEMN VOWS: A COMMITMENT OF SERVICE UNTIL DEATH

Priestly ordination is often seen as the climax of one's life as a Dominican friar. But actually it's the profession of solemn vows which unites a man to the Order of Preachers until death.

For many people it's easier to understand when explained in terms of a marital relationship. The novitiate (first year of formation) is a period of courting, during which a man learns more about Dominican life. First vows, sometimes referred to as simple vows and made at the end of one's novice year, are an occasion of engagement, at which a man makes a commitment to our way of life for a certain number of years. Solemn vows is the time at which a man professes his commitment until death, as one would in marriage.

The profession of solemn vows usually takes place within the context of Mass. After the proclamation of the Gospel, the brothers are called forward and asked to declare their willingness to live in accord with the evangelical counsels. After the homily, each brother approaches the altar, kneels and then places his hands in the Provincial's hands atop the Book of Constitutions of the Order of Preachers, while making his profession of obedience until death.

When one thinks about the vowed life of a religious brother or sister, the evangelical counsels of poverty, chastity and obedience usually come to mind. So many are surprised to learn that Dominicans only take one vow — the vow of obedience.

According to the Constitutions of the Order of Preachers, it is "by obedience [that] a person dedicates himself totally to God, and his actions approximate to the goal of profession, which is the perfection of charity. Everything else, too, in the apostolic life is included under obedience" (LCO, 19).

Obedience — the offering up of one's very self in service to God — gives unity to the life of the brothers, and it is the means by which they grow in charity and love. Along with obedience, poverty and chastity are expected.

Poverty means renouncing the possession of private goods and the power to acquire new ones. Like the first apostles, Saint Dominic and his companions held everything in common. This kind of poverty frees a friar from a desire to have more than what is necessary. It also allows a brother to grow in his sense of dependency on the Lord. The friar learns to trust in God's providence and care.


Chastity, in the case of a Dominican, refers to a life of celibacy. Without the responsibilities of family life, a friar is able to devote himself ceaselessly to the life of preaching and the proclamation of the Gospel. But this is not a lonely endeavor, for the brethren have one another. They work, pray, study and live together, supporting each other in all things.

Along with this lifelong commitment, the transition from simple to solemn vows means that a brother now enjoys certain responsibilities, such as voting rights in chapter and the possibility of being elected to various offices. But more than that, a brother's religious consecration allows him to grow in love of God and neighbor. Thus he is driven to proclaim Jesus Christ to the world.
