



### **Br. John Vianney Russell**

### Pasadena, CA

After receiving a B.A. in Integral Studies from St. Mary's College of California, Br. John Vianney earned a J.D. from Catholic University of America in 2016. While studying at CUA, he frequently encountered Dominicans in the bookstore, and their conversations revealed a shared love of truth. Br. John Vianney finds inspiration in St. Augustine's voluminous writings and greatly admires St. Thomas Aquinas for his clarity and ability to engage various sides of an argument. Dominican sisters educated Br. Peter Augustine when he

This has been especially true in this past year during which his mother has passed away. Br. Peter Augustine draws hope and consolation from St. Paul's words to the Romans: "If we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's" (Romans 14:8). # PRAYING WITH PAINTING: LENTEN MEDITATION WITH THE HELP OF SACRED ART

Christianity is a religion of the Incarnation: the Word becoming flesh and taking on our humanity to save us. *Praying with Painting* will be a practical and interactive guide to Lenten prayer by meditating on the Passion of Christ with the help of sacred art.

**Br. John Paul Puschautz**, a brother of Saint John since 2011, grew up in Chicago, IL, and attended the University of Illinois where he studied fine art painting before responding to Jesus' call to religious life. After getting his Masters in Theology at Immaculate Conception Seminary in New Jersey, he is currently doing postgraduate studies at the Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology in Berkeley, CA.

# THE PSALMS: LIFTING UP THE SOUL TO GOD

APRIL 14, 2021, 7 PM ON ZOOM WITH ARCHBISHOP MICHAEL J. BYRNES, S.T.D.

Archbishop Byrnes' presentation will focus on the poetic nature of a psalm as a vocal activity in song and chant; the importance of emotional content in the psalm; the scandal of crying out to God and/or the imprecatory Psalms.

Archbishop Michael J. Byrnes was born in 1958 in Detroit, where he grew up. He attended the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Microbiology in 1979. He entered formation at Sacred Heart Major Seminary in Detroit in 1990, and was ordained May 25, 1996. In 1999 he departed to Rome to study at the Pontifical Gregorian University, where he earned his Doctorate in Sacred Theology in 2003. On April 4, 2019, he became the Metropolitan Archbishop of Agana. Among Archbishop Byrnes's passions are participating in marathons and triathlons.

We are called to be stewards of the earth. Pope Francis tells us that this means we are to be protectors and ones who nurture the planet.

On the first two Sundays of Lent we encouraged you to learn about caring for the soil and composting, and perhaps planting something.

How do we nurture growing things in our garden or plant and tend new growth? The science is clear: Our reliance on dangerous pesticides is ruining our environment and pesticides like neonicotinoids are driving bee species to the brink of extinction. Have you considered learning more about organic gardening? There are MANY resources on line that will introduce you to the art and science of growing things with an emphasis on cultivating an ecosystem that sustains and nourishes plants and soil microbes and helps manage pests in a way that is beneficial to insects rather than simply killing them (including helpful insects) and making plants grow with artificial fertilizes that harm other species and the planet. Being stewards of the earth can start with small steps in our own back yard.

Water is one of our most important resources and one that is becoming more scarce, especially in California.

Did you know that **Graywater** is an abundant, safe and reliable local water source?

California's Graywater Standards are now part of the State Plumbing Code, making it legal to use graywater everywhere in California.

Many small landscaping and plumbing businesses have specialized in the design and installation of residential graywater systems. Larger and more complex systems are designed by engineers.

Common sense says water should be reused as many times as possible. The good thing is, that it can be, and your pocket and Earth will thank you for it.

Intentional and respectful use of water and nurturing of a garden, or even of a single plant can help remind us that every one of us is created out of love and made in God's image and likeness (Genesis 1:26)

In Laudato Si', Pope Francis reminds us:

"We were conceived in the heart of God, and for this reason, each of us is the result of a thought of God. Each of us is willed, each of us is loved, each of us is necessary." (65) "We must regain the conviction that we need one another, that we have a shared responsibility for others and the world; and that being good and decent are worth it." (229)

In the St. Raymond Bible Study – *Unlocking the Mystery of the Bible*, we studied the first chapters of Genesis. We see that on the 6<sup>th</sup> day, God made the creatures of the earth AND he made man. We share the same day of creation. We are inextricably tied to all other creatures. In Genesis 2:15 we are told to till and keep the garden of the world. Tilling means cultivating, while keeping means caring for and protecting.

During this season of Lent, let us nurture something and let that remind us that we were created with intention and love by God to be workers in the beautiful Garden of the World He has given over to our care.

Almighty God, in giving us dominion over things on earth, you made us fellow workers in your creation. Give us wisdom and reverence to use the resources of nature so that no one may suffer from our abuse of them, and so generations yet to come may continue to steward your resources well.


