

God Moment

The Dominicans are doing a cosmetic overhaul (paint, carpeting, and rearranging of the liturgical items) in the small chapel we have in Arbor House. For those who do not know. Arbor House is the house where the Dominicans live on the other side of the property from the Church. One of the items we are adding to our chapel is a larger tabernacle that I found in our attic. Of course, no one could find the key for it, so I had to have the lock rekeyed. When I was picking up the tabernacle from the locksmith another customer asked me what is I said in a matter-of-fact way, "It is a tabernacle." Because I just assumed everyone knows what a tabernacle is. The man then replied in a friendly but snarky way, "And a tabernacle is...?" I thought I now have an opportunity to evangelize. I gave the man a four-minute explanation of the Israelites journey in the desert, the "tent of meeting" where God met with Moses during the 40 years in the desert, the Holy of Holies in the Temple in Jerusalem, the consecration at Mass, and why we repose the Eucharist in the tabernacle. When I finished, the man looked at me, gave an approving nod and said, "Cool." I guess we never know when God is going to give us the opportunity to share our faith.

Good News

EMOTIONAL AND MENTAL WELLNESS MINISTRY – A GIFT FOR OUR PARISH COMMUNITY (PART ONE)

I begin with Christ as we throw open the doors into our newly formed Emotional and Mental Wellness Ministry. Christ always makes for a good beginning when we remember that He came to preach the "Good News" of the gospel and St. Raymond Parish was listening, heeding the call to serve our community with love and support and spiritual companionship. A new team of parishioners has assembled to lead the way and show us how to be present to one another.

We celebrate this team of eight for the next two Sundays in this column. It's important that we know who they are and of their commitment to the wellness of our parishioners and their family members. They've been

training months as each recognized that the deep need in larger Bay area and in Menlo Park had grown. Christ didn't ask them to sit down and think about suffering. He said, "follow me" and they responded to His call. This team is the "good news."



I'd like to tell some of their stories. Where did Christ find them? From what I can tell so far, they are ready, ready to create a place of compassion and healing, to offer acts of love and understanding and friendship. This is where they place their hope. Let's welcome them in our midst and begin to see their service lifting us from our own grief, our sorrow, our losses our brokenness, and even the stresses in our everyday lives that sometimes feel like mountains.

No less than Pope Francis has reminded us that prayer is a powerful source of healing and peace. "It can make a great difference when we move from praying for people to praying with people." We shrink any distance, any divide between us, and we are met.

Christ is among us! Who heard his call?

John Butler: From his own lived experience in San Mateo County, John was witness to the customary separation between mental health therapy and spiritual healing. He learned he was not his diagnosis. His recovery began when his spiritual well-being began to support his

emotional and mental therapy. John is eager to pray with our parishioners. His particular love is for spontaneous prayer that goes right to the heart of individual needs. It's personal. It's powerful.

Gabrielle Lou: A psychologist, Gabrielle sees the direct connection between psychology and spirituality. In her words, she "tends to the soul." Referencing the Greek definition of the word "psyche," as the human soul or spirit, Gabrielle brings her knowledge as an integrator of mind and soul. What a hopeful path forward for all of us.

Ken Doran speaks of the excellent training the team received and what the team learned from each other. Charisms were explored – what were their natural gifts and what could they offer to this ministry? In numerous role-playing exercises, each saw the other's strengths. Shared learning came from videos, well-researched documents from across the country, and practice in what

he called "mental health first-aid."

Fr. John Winkowitsch, O.P. seamlessly tied his homily on Sunday to the Emotional and Mental Wellness Ministry. He talked about the fundamental needs for "flour" (education), "oil" (practical

support), and "rain" (for growth and healing). The two widows in the gospel story who gave all they had in the temple were *animated* by their love of God. And then Father introduced the new team who are also *animated* by their love of God. Right there in our midst, blessed by God, he commissioned them to help us all overcome the stigma of mental illness, to notice and learn to recognize those who might be struggling. It was a blessing worthy of our new "disciples" and what we will learn from them.

In co-chair **Lori Mirek's** words, " Most importantly, our team consists of loving and caring parishioners who are here to listen to and pray with our parishioners."

Good News closes with Jesus' words to his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you."

BUT THE WISE SHALL SHINE BRIGHT...THOSE WHO LEAD THE MANY TO JUSTICE SHALL BE LIKE THE STARS FOREVER

The readings this week speak of the darkest of times, but there is a definite message of hope as well. We are promised in Hebrews that God will be victorious; His enemies will be the footstool of Jesus.

In our time, with the news amplifying differences between us and the wider world struggling with the impact of a climate environment which is especially harming the poor, it is easy to feel hopeless; our energy can feel sapped. But we are comforted because we know God has already won. And we know He loves us. He proved His great love for us because He allowed His son to be the one perfect sacrifice for our sins, once, for all, so that there is forgiveness for those consecrated to him.

We need to recognize this, hold onto our hope. Then we need to do our job, even amidst emotional fatigue and fear. We need to do as God commanded. We need to invest our energy in loving God and our neighbor, in caring for the poor and vulnerable, and in tending creation, our common home which has been entrusted to us. We can do this. Each of us was made in the image of God with a deep desire for relationship with Him. And God wants to be in relationship with us, helping us as we seek to do His will.



The 'signs of our time' seem overwhelming but even now there are other signs. The COP gathering of nations in Glasgow to address climate change showed that most nations are taking climate change seriously at last. International youth movements are energized and mobilized. They are inspiring (pushing) us to take decisive action to address issues of injustice, peace, and climate change.

Jesus is inviting us to trust God and to have hope. Take a walk this week and open yourselves to let God's creation show you signs of great joy and of God's love and care for you.
