EMOTIONAL AND MENTAL HEALTH WELLNESS MINISTRY - A GIFT FOR OUR PARISH (PART 2)

The Gospel writer, Mark, gives evidence that Jesus designed the ministry of his disciples to be a team effort. Mark wrote, "Then Jesus went around teaching from village to village. Calling the Twelve to him, he began to send them out two by two." (Mark 6:6-7)

Sue, a team member of our new ministry, reminded me of this quote from Mark's gospel. She emphasized how important it was for the team to get to know one another. Their six months of training and time spent sharing their own stories with one another has helped them better understand Jesus' "two by two" design for his disciples and the nature of a team approach to sharing our faith and compassion in this new ministry. Sue has had many years of lived experience accompanying others in their difficult times. "It is a very different experience to have someone walk with you than to walk alone," she said. "I'm very proud to be a part of this ministry." She also looks forward to what the team will learn from the parish survey. By example, this team will lead us into a deeper understanding of how intimately connected our faith is to our emotional and mental well-being.

Dora called on her break from her pre-K class. She was ready and eager to talk about why she felt the call to this ministry. Influenced by her own personal experience of a serious physical illness, convinced of the power of faith and communal prayer, it was with great joy and gratitude that she said YES. To serve is her way of saying thank you to God and her faith community. "We are vessels, God's vessels. Spiritual health is primary to physical and mental well-being. God's presence moves in each of us. We are each being transformed and restored to our Christ consciousness when we open our hearts, our minds, our souls, our spirits to one another."

Cecilia brings her program management skills to this ministry along with a personal reason. "I want to be a part of bringing to others what I couldn't find when I needed help. Building trust means everything to our team. Trust begins with being able to connect quickly, listen well, and discover the best ways to serve our parishioners with their challenges. I know of the significance of those needs from my own experience." Cecilia is also developing a list of resources that will

be available to the team and the parish, a list that will take time to develop as the team learns more about the needs of parishioners. A survey is available on the St. Raymond website and where you pick up your bulletin after mass. This survey is important and anonymous.

Arlene is the latest addition to the team. She is a retired middle school teacher from Sacramento who lost her husband to cancer five years ago. Her natural compassion for others found a solution to her deep concern for the multiple challenges her students were facing at home and at school. She went back to school and obtained a master's degree in counseling at St. Mary's College in Moraga. Arlene has moved here very recently, persuaded by her daughter and grandchildren to come to Menlo Park. After an accidental meeting with Father Jerome (she came late to a BBQ), she found herself saying yes to her first love, which is working with She too talked of the importance of building trust between team members and within the larger parish community. "It was with pure joy that I learned of this new ministry from Father Jerome. It's perfect timing for me." (Another hint of Good News; Father Jerome has 'the knack'!)



She adds the words of Pope Francis in his prayer intention for the month of November, "Jesus' words can help us and others to find solace: Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest."

Pat: It's been a joy to meet this faith-filled, enthusiastic, and talented group of people, each with different gifts and life experience. They remind me of the words of Thomas Merton, "God is generosity. Creation is always happening. God loves us into the presence of God pouring Himself out into each of us."



From November 1-12, the gathering of nations, politicians, scientists, and individuals at COP26 has foretold to us, as Daniel did, "a time unsurpassed in distress". But also, agreements were made and plans laid to lead our environment and economies away from the tipping point. It is time for each of us to do what we can, individually and in communities; in national and international governments; to act with

HOPE for a cleaner, more sustainable and just future for the planet and all its inhabitants. There are many secular movements and organizations we recognize, not as competitors or new quasi-religions, but as partners in the hope of renewal of climate integrity and social justice. 

We know the fruition of our waiting and working is still to come, but in the words of Pope Francis:

As never before in history, common destiny beckons us to seek a new beginning ... Let ours be a time remembered for the awakening of a new reverence for life, the firm resolve to achieve sustainability, the quickening of the struggle for justice and peace, and the joyful celebration of life. (LS207).

As we begin the second week of Advent, we light the candle of PEACE, For God will show all the earth your splendor you will be named by God forever, the peace of justice, the glory of God's worship...

How often PEACE is joined with justice! Pope Francis's two recent encyclicals link the two as well: the PEACE and healing of the earth described in *Laudato Si'* must be forged by justice for the lands and



living things of God's creation. The fraternity of Fratelli Tutti is possible only through justice between all peoples of the earth in their social, ecological, and economic interactions.

During the previous month of November, designated "Indigenous Peoples' Month", and at the recent COP26 conference on climate change, our attention has been drawn to the injustices and harms repeatedly borne by indigenous peoples in the social, political, economic, and critically, environmental spheres. Pope Francis reminds us:

Climate change is a global problem with grave implications: environmental, social, economic, political and for the distribution of goods. It represents one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day. Its worst impact will probably be felt by developing countries in coming decades. Many of the poor live in areas particularly affected by phenomena related to warming, and their means of subsistence are largely dependent on natural reserves and ecosystemic services such as agriculture, fishing and forestry (LS25).

During this second week of Advent, let us work and pray for PEACE and justice between all peoples of the earth as we "hear the cry of the earth, the cry of the poor."
