# **BLESSING OF THROATS**

Thursday, February 3rd is the feast of St. Blaise. He was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a physician before becoming a bishop. His cult spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat. Blessing of throats will be offered at the end of the 8:15 am Mass.

# **POPE FRANCIS' SYNOD**

Pope Francis has planned the next World Synod of Bishops in October 2022, with the theme "Synodality" which means "Walking Together", and invites the whole Church to participate in the preparatory process. The goal of this Synod is to provide an opportunity for the entire People of God to discern together how to move forward on the path towards being a more synodal church in the long term. This unprecedented opportunity will facilitate discussion and reflection to help shape the Church's understanding of herself and her mission of evangelization and forming disciples.

The Archdiocese of San Francisco will kick-off the local synodal process in January by asking every Catholic to participate in the Disciple Maker Index survey. This survey is a nationally recognized survey administered at parishes around the United States and Canada since 2013 by the Catholic Leadership Institute. At St. Raymond, we completed the survey in 2020. Those results will be shared with the Archdiocese.

In February and March, engagement/listening sessions will be offered throughout the Archdiocese. We welcome and encourage all of you to attend one of the engagement sessions, in-person or virtually.

San Mateo County in-person sessions: February 26th 9-11 am, St. Augustine Church, South San Francisco; March 5th 9-11 am, St. Veronica Church, South San Francisco; March 5th 9-11 am St. Matthew Church, San Mateo; March 6th 1-3 pm St. Pius Redwood City.

The schedule for the virtual sessions will be available soon. Registration is required for a virtual session. More details are available through the Archdiocesan website at <u>www.sfarch.org/synod</u>.

After these sessions are complete and the data gathered, attentive to the faith of the people of God, the Synod Bishops will work together for ecclesial consensus. The results will be submitted to the Holy Father and an implementation plan will follow in each diocese. This is a way for everybody to participate in the "Listening Church" and its further growth in this century and beyond.

# **SUNDAY VISITOR**

Did anyone notice the *visitor* that joined us at Sunday's outdoor mass on January 2nd? I've been thinking about her for several weeks now, hoping she'd return, but she hasn't. I've come to think it was a God thing, perhaps a herald of the New Year.

Mass had begun and though it was chilly, the sun promised some warmth, there were few clouds, and the sky was bluest blue. We were singing the Gloria when I happened to look up. I love the redwood trees that tower over the school. Like sentries, they define our outdoor cathedral and the children's school and playground.

On the very top of one of them, the one that's a little browned out, that doesn't look quite as healthy as the rest, perched a large white bundle. I wish I'd had binoculars at that moment as it was impossible to make out what it was. It wasn't there when mass began because I always look up at the trees at the start. They remind me of where I am. Father John then welcomed us and we confessed aloud together. I think maybe the large bird arrived at the sound of the keyboard and Lauri's pure voice leading us in the Gloria.

Our visitor remained quite still through the readings and the homily and the prayers of the faithful and the Creed and the liturgy of the Eucharist. All I could see was a large white ball, feathers of course, but what kind of bird has such a full white chest? My eyes remained glued as I listened and sang and recited, waiting for her to turn, to display her wings. But no. I kept my eyes on her during communion and after as I sat in my chair, grateful for the nourishment of the spirit-filled Eucharist and the music filling the field of hearts spread out colorfully in warm coats.

Still on her perch, watching apparently, she turned, stretched her brown and gray wings, and resettled. We stood. Father gave us the final blessing and Lauri led us in song. I swear, it was on the last chord, as people began to turn toward the donuts, the big bird lifted into the air and flew west. She had come to mass just about on time and left when it was over.

Now I could freely google. Before, I didn't want to miss her when she moved (or be on my phone during Mass). If any of you are bird watchers or have seen them before, you already know who she was. I had no idea. "She" was an osprey. And for the sake of comparison, an osprey is smaller than a bald eagle and larger than a redtail hawk, and has a chest of white feathers.
