In Poland, for example, the blessing of the baskets is known as święcenie pokarmow wiełkanocnych, a practice dating to the 15th century or earlier, and one which is still maintained by most families in Poland (and to some extent in other countries) on Holy Saturday.

April 14, 15, 16, (Thurs, Fri, Sat) are the dates of this year's parish retreat, open to all. Join with fellow parishioners-and bring a friend, all are welcome!to immerse ourselves in the most beautiful moments not only in the life of the Church but in all of Salvation History. Our three-day retreat focuses on:

7:00 Fridav's pm Commemoration of the Lord's Passion includes Veneration of the Cross, when all the faithful may approach the cross, be quite literally at the foot of the cross to adore it. this "tree on which he died." It



ends at approximately 8:15 pm in silence, in order that we may carry in our hearts our meditation on his death as we move on into the night.

And Fr. Jerome, sailing around it all like the Father he is, but also, perhaps with the gospel in mind, he welcomed his guests. He had much to celebrate. The aliveness of the parish was bursting from confinement. What was lost, was found.

WALK HUMBLY WITH YOUR GOD

In our Lenten Bible study, we talked about what Jesus meant when he said, "Follow Me". In some languages they translate this to "Live like Me."

The passage describing Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem teaches us so much (as usual) about how Jesus lived, and what it really means to "Follow Him". Unlike the standard royal entrance procession of the day, Jesus does not enter the city on a mighty warhorse, as a conquering hero or king. Rather, he sat on a colt (or "donkey")-- a meek and unassuming animal befitting the character of its rider. As at His birth in a stable, Jesus arrives in humility. Later this week, we will see Jesus as he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross (Phil. 2)

We humans now gather to sing joyful praises to God, but are we really humbled by what He has done for us and all He has given us? Are we deeply grateful and willing to care for and treasure this world? Climate change has left barren so many parts of the planet; it has left animals like the colt to starve in the woods. Excessive heat is some areas saps people's ability to work even if the land were still able to produce. As stewards of God's creation and protectors of life, we are called to "care for our common home," as Pope Francis so eloquently asks of us in Laudato Si'. And this includes doing what we can to reduce our consumption of energy and resources that contribute to climate change. Like Jesus on the colt, we may need to humble ourselves in order to fulfill our calling to care for creation. But it is not easy: "Once we lose our humility and become enthralled with the possibility of limitless mastery over everything, we inevitably end up harming society and the environment. It is not easy to promote this kind of healthy humility or happy sobriety when we consider ourselves autonomous, when we exclude God from our lives or replace him with our own ego and think that our subjective feelings can define what is right and what is wrong." (LS 224)

Pope Francis urges us to see that "there is a mystical meaning to be found in a leaf, in a mountain trail, in a dewdrop, in a poor person's face." (LS 233)

May we learn to respect and value every aspect of the natural world, for it manifests some dimension of the glory our loving Creator.

Lord, teach us to be humble before your wondrous Creation.

May we become aware of ourselves as one among many
