

## 4 Dominican Corner

### ALLELUIA! ALLELUIA!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia! Alleluia!

We are in the midst of the Octave of Easter. Like Christmas, Easter Sunday does not last for one day but for eight days. For eight days we celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord with the highest solemnity and abundant joy. We sing out "Alleluia!" with full voice and with awe-inspiring chants. After forty days of holding back on singing this particular word of praise, "alleluia," hearing this word resound in the chapel has that much more resonance in the soul. After forty days of the somber, penitential season of Lent, the celebration of Easter is all the more joyful. And the festivities do not end after eight days - the season of Easter lasts until Pentecost, for a total of fifty days.

I remember a lifelong Catholic telling me of her surprise when she first learned that the Easter season is actually longer than Lent, that the austerities of Lent are meant to lead to an even longer celebration of the Resurrection. "That makes all the difference!" she told me. Indeed, keeping where we are headed in mind makes all the difference for what we do in the present, imbuing it with purpose and meaning.

In the present, we joyfully celebrate the Resurrection of the Lord, for the sake of praising God and in order to reinforce in our minds and hearts the central mysteries of our Faith and our hope. In Christ's subjecting Himself to death and then rising in victory over death, He has redeemed us, giving us the way out of the bondage of sin and inviting us into God's glory through His humanity. We celebrate Christ's Resurrection, knowing that this mystery also holds the promise of our own resurrection at the end of the world. As St. Paul says, "But now Christ is risen from the dead, the first fruits of them that sleep: For by a man came death, and by a man the resurrection of the dead. And as in Adam all die, so also in Christ all shall be made alive." (1 Cor 15:20-22)

Let us then continue our celebration, praising God for His marvelous deeds, both in the events of Christ's life and in our own lives, always eager to be more and more united to Christ, especially in our festivities.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Alleluia!

### WELLNESS IN OUR ADVANCED YEARS

The St. Raymond Emotional and Mental Wellness Ministry invites you to our first Community Event on April 20th at 9am: **Wellness in our Advanced Years**. Pastries and Coffee will be provided, and all are invited!

This event is focused on supporting those in our parish who responded to our EMWM survey in December who'd like to learn how to help friends and family struggling with anxiety or depression. A panel of 3 speakers will share and be available for Q&A afterward. They are:

**Carolyn Jakopin:** "I was the wife of a husband with mental health challenges and am the mother of 2 sons living with bipolar disorder. I plan to share how my faith led me to learn some dos and don'ts that helped me manage the agitation I experienced in the situation, and to have them honor my boundaries."

**Calvin Shelton:** "I am an older adult who has been living with paranoid schizophrenia and related symptoms all my life and have learned coping skills to maintain a balance in my life. I will discuss the Recovery Model of treatment which is holistic in its approach and involves more than just being medicated."

**John Butler:** "I was awarded the George Culores Consumer Hall of Fame Award with a Commendation from the SMC Board of Supervisors for my Mental Health work and personal development success. I will share my lived experience on how I found healing and recovery over alcoholism, substance addiction, suicidal ideation, and major depressive disorder."

## CLEAR OUT THE OLD YEAST THAT YOU MAY BECOME A FRESH BATCH

At Easter we celebrate the New Life Resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. First, we walked with Jesus through His suffering; the humility and love Jesus displayed, from his entrance into Jerusalem, to giving us the Eucharist at the last supper, to Jesus, God, humbly surrendering Himself to the cross. He gave Himself entirely for us. Taking on our sins He paid our price. Then there was the rising of Jesus Christ from the dead, so we can receive forgiveness of our sins. Recalling the reading from the 5th Sunday of Lent, this is 'Something New' indeed.



How do we respond to this overwhelming outrageous love God has lavished on us? In his first letter to the Corinthians, Paul tells us to 'clear out the old yeast so we can be something new and fresh' in Christ. Letting go our old selfishness and instead striving to live as he lived - in humility, sincerity and truth. One area in which we all need to invest more sincere effort is in our care for the most vulnerable and for creation which God put into to our care.



Saint Pope John Paul II, Pope Benedict, and most powerfully, Pope Francis have been urging us to take a new approach since our "way of understanding human life and activity has gone awry." [LS101] This Easter season, let us open ourselves to the power of Jesus and the resurrection that we can be transformed in our hearts. Let us seek God's guidance and help to

recognize and embrace smart change to support what is best for the environment, for care of the most vulnerable, and for justice. The outcome is in our own hands. We can commit ourselves to the birth of new life for earth.
