

EASTER SUNDAY ZOOM

Gratitude connects me to my St. Raymond Community on this third pandemic Easter. Far from Menlo Park, I celebrated Easter Sunday Mass with fifteen other "Mass goers" on zoom. It was the Alleluia Sunday. There was Father Jerome, settling the young altar servers into their roles before Mass began. I could hear the choir warming their voices, mothers and fathers arriving with strollers and chairs through the back gate usually used for donut delivery. Deacon Tom was readying the altar and ambo – a last minute check on the all-important Holy vessels. I could just make out the gathering of parishioners on the lawn in the reflected glass of the building behind the altar. I was transported home to my beloved St. Raymond community as Alleluias rang in the entrance hymn.

Was Zoom even a thing before Covid? For many months we were able to "see" our pastor and his vital assistants (Father Jerome, Father John, Deacon Tom, Lauri, John Sanchez), and see the cardboard photos of parishioners in the pews. It was all so creative, and we were included and spoken to almost as though we were really there.

That's how this third pandemic Easter Sunday Mass felt to me. I was there. Grateful for Zoom, I could tune in from the start (even a little before), hear familiar voices read the liturgies, sing, renew my baptism, and get my homework assignment from Father Jerome's homily on the transformative meaning of the burial cloths mentioned four times in John's gospel. "I am not finished, I will be back;" Jewish tradition explained in the placement of the cloths that had covered Jesus's head.

I missed not really being there on the Menlo Park lawn but Zoom gave me an opportunity to imagine, to place myself with Mary of Magdala finding the stone removed from the tomb, running with her to find Simon Peter and to the other disciple that Jesus loved. "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him," Mary tells them. What was that like for her?

He is risen. Alleluia, Alleluia. Hundreds of us on this third pandemic Sunday were present, not in the same place, but present nonetheless to the events of the resurrection, summoned to remember again and again that the evidence of "He is Risen," lives in us.

Thank you, St. Raymond clergy and staff. Good News ends the column as it began, with gratitude. Alleluia!

THEN I HEARD EVERY CREATURE ON HEAVEN AND ON EARTH AND UNDER THE EARTH AND IN THE SEA, EVERYTHING IN THE UNIVERSE, CRY OUT: "TO THE ONE WHO SITS ON THE THRONE AND TO THE LAMB BE BLESSING AND HONOR, GLORY AND MIGHT, FOREVER AND EVER."

This week we see the growth of the disciples from confusion and fear to a full understanding of the power and wonder of the resurrection. Through the healing presence of Jesus and his direction to feed, tend, and love His sheep (and later with the coming of the Holy Spirit) they move from their initial hesitation to proclaiming belief in the risen Lord, fearlessly preaching, and even rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of Jesus' name.

In Revelation we get a glimpse of the future where there is praise and rejoicing of all creation before the heavenly throne. "Everything in the universe cry out...blessing and honor, glory and might." No creature is absent from this heavenly choir. All give praise to the Lamb. Though this is a vision of the future, that future begins now with us.

The Holy Spirit calls each of us to proclaim the God's glory – including grateful joy in His earthly creation. The reading in



Revelation helps us realize that each living thing created by God has its place within our "common home." Increasingly, all of creation is more dependent on human care and stewardship – an awesome responsibility indeed.

Let us grow in the appreciation that we are not the only creatures that praise God. But as stewards of creation, we are the ones charged with protecting and caring for it. Pope Francis' Laudato Si'

(165) "there is reason to hope that humanity, at the dawn of the twenty-first century, will be remembered as having generously shouldered its grave responsibilities"

(207) "Let ours be a time remembered for the awakening of a new reverence for life...the firm resolve to achieve sustainability; the quickening of the struggle for justice and peace, and the joyful celebration of life."
