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
Bible Study

Speaker Series

CONTEMPLATIVE PRAYER IN THE CATHOLIC SPIRITUAL TRADITION

TUESDAY, JULY 26 @ 7 PM IN CHURCH

Is it possible to live at the pace of prayer in our postmodern milieu? St. Elisabeth of the Trinity, a Carmelite mystic at the dawn of the 20th Century, believed that God's abiding presence should be at the center of everyone's life, including parents and families. To this end, she proposed to her sister, a young mother, a way of life rooted in contemplative prayer. This presentation describes this kind of prayer and how to live it drawing from the same Biblical sources that she used.

Dr. Anthony Lilles is a professor of theology at St. Patrick's Seminary and University in Menlo Park. Teaching spiritual theology for over twenty-five years in Denver and Los Angeles, he is an expert in Carmelite mysticism who studied at Franciscan University in Steubenville, Ohio,



completing his graduate and post graduate work at the University of St. Thomas in Rome. He podcasts at <u>DiscerningHearts.com</u> and his meditations are published at <u>SpiritualDirection.com</u>. There will be a potluck before the Speaker Series—details below.





Saint of the Week



ST. CAMILLUS DE LELLIS, PRIEST (JULY 18)

Humanly speaking, Camillus was not a likely candidate for sainthood. His mother died when he was a child, his father neglected him, and he grew up with an excessive love for gambling. At 17, he was afflicted with a disease of his leg that remained with him for life. In Rome he entered the San Giacomo Hospital for Incurables as both patient and servant, but was dismissed for quarrelsomeness after nine months. He served in the Venetian army for three years.

Then in the winter of 1574, when he was 24, Camillus gambled away everything he had—savings, weapons, literally down to his shirt. He accepted work at the Capuchin friary at Manfredonia, and was one day so moved by a sermon of the superior that he began a conversion that changed his life. He entered the Capuchin novitiate, but was dismissed because of the apparently incurable sore on his leg. After another stint of service at San Giacomo, he came back to the Capuchins, only to be dismissed again, for the same reason.

Again, back at San Giacomo, his dedication was rewarded by his being made superintendent. Camillus devoted the rest of his life to the care of the sick. Along with Saint John of God he has been named patron of hospitals, nurses, and the sick. With the advice of his friend Saint Philip Neri, he studied for the priesthood and was ordained at the age of 34. Contrary to the advice of his friend, Camillus left San Giacomo and founded a congregation of his own. As superior, he devoted much of his own time to the care of the sick. Charity was his first concern, but the physical aspects **5** of the hospital also received his diligent attention. Camillus insisted on cleanliness and the technical competence of those who served the sick. The members of his community bound themselves to serve prisoners and persons infected by the plague as well as those dying in private homes. Some of his men were with troops fighting in Hungary and Croatia in 1595, forming the first recorded military field ambulance. In Naples, he and his men went onto the galleys that had plague and were not allowed to land. He discovered that there were people being buried alive, and ordered his brothers to continue the prayers for the dying 15 minutes after apparent death.

Camillus himself suffered the disease of his leg through his life. In his last illness, he left his own bed to see if other patients in the hospital needed help.

Do you love spending time on the beach?

Birds like threatened snowy plovers and brown pelicans can be found on our coasts this summer, nesting and resting on our beaches.

Whether you love the beach for sunbathing, boogieboarding, walking your dog, fishing, kayaking, or boating, you can be a bird-friendly beachgoer with 4 easy steps:

- 1. Keep dogs on leash or visit a dog-friendly beach.
- Give shorebirds and seabirds at least 100 feet of space—that's the equivalent of 16 beach towels. Respect fences and signs and stay out of areas that are roped off for breeding birds.
- 3. Remove trash, especially plastic, and food scraps, which attract animals that might eat shorebirds' eggs and/or chicks.
- 4. Avoid use of loud or large flying things that shorebirds and seabirds perceive as predators such as drones, fireworks, balloons, and kites.



We hope you grab some binoculars and enjoy watching coastal birds while respecting and protecting their habitat.

Listed as endangered in 1970, the species rebounded after the DDT ban, enough to be removed from the endangered species list in 2009.
