
HOW TO BE HAPPY

US Feedback for Pope's Synod

Our Pope has initiated a global synod that will collect feedback from parishioners worldwide to deepen our communion as a Church. In the US, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) has recently concluded the "listening" phase of the synod in which they conducted intentional listening sessions across the country. I know many of you participated in these as I did. I was struck by the thoughtful and discerned discussions in these sessions that shared hopes and concerns for our Church. The USCCB has published the following report summarizing the excitement, confusion, and skepticism of our fellow parishioners across the country: https://delivr.com/2xrqi

Your Pastoral Council spent our entire October meeting discussing how St. Raymond Church can act on what we learned from this document. We encourage everyone to read it as it's well-written, insightful, and only 13 pages! We were particularly struck by the comment that:

"People noted that the Church seems to prioritize doctrine over people, rules and regulations over lived reality. People want the Church to be a home for the wounded and broken, not an institution for the perfect. They want the Church to meet people where they are, wherever they are, and walk with them rather than judging them, to build real relationships through care and authenticity..."

It addresses the enduring wounds stemming from the sexual abuse crisis, the trend towards disengagement and intensifying isolation loneliness, the deep divisions in the Church including the lack of unity of US bishops, and the marginalization of many segments of parishioners. It challenges us to become a more welcoming Church through better connection with the following groups of community members: youth, special needs (e.g., hearing disabled), divorced, LGBTQ+, women, culturally/ethnically diverse, and those who are experiencing racism (including indigenous Catholics). It concludes by stressing the need for ongoing adult faith formation. appreciation for the role of the laity, and a call to continued discernment to ensure continued to listening to the voice of the lived experience of the People of God—you and me!

Speaker Series

THE NAME OF JESUS AS EARLY CHRISTIAN PRAYER

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 7:15 PM, CHAPEL PRECEDED BY POTLUCK, 6:15 PM, PARISH HALL

For centuries Christian ascetics have struggled to fulfill the Scriptural command to pray without ceasing. One such solution was to turn to the name of Jesus itself as a prayer during times of struggle and difficulty. This talk will examine this tradition, its spiritual and theological foundations, as it was practiced in the early centuries of the Church, and will



attempt to offer some insight into how such practices could be adapted for the use of contemporary Christians.

Fr. Ambrose Sigman, O.P., has been a Dominican since 2006. After his ordination to the priesthood, he spent two years as the parochial vicar at St Raymond in Menlo Park before going off for doctoral studies. Having completed his studies at the Pontifical Oriental Institute in Rome, Fr. Ambrose is now a professor at the Dominican School of Philosophy and Theology in Berkeley, CA.

WHAT'S AN ACOLYTE?



Earlier this month I, with seven of my Dominican brothers, was instituted to the ministry of acolyte. The acolytes are those designated by the Church to assist the priest in the celebration of the Mass. And so the ministry of acolyte is usually conferred upon those who are on the path to be ordained to the priesthood.

It is also the responsibility of the acolyte to train those who might serve at the altar on a more temporary basis (like our school children). It is also entrusted to the acolyte, in the case of necessity and in the absence of a priest or deacon, to distribute Holy Communion, bring Communion to the sick, or to expose the Blessed Sacrament for adoration.

During the ritual of institution, the Bishop (or in my case the Dominican Prior Provincial) places a vessel into our hands, with bread to be used in the celebration of Mass saying: Take this vessel with bread for the celebration of the Eucharist. Make your life worthy of your service at the table of the Lord and of his Church.

Prior to 1972, the ministry of acolyte was one of several "steps" on the way to priesthood. On their way to ordination young men would become: porter, lector, exorcist, acolyte, and subdeacon, before being ordained a deacon, and finally a priest. Pope Paul VI changed this system, leaving only "lector" (or reader) and "acolyte" in place. This change also means that it is no longer exclusively for those preparing for ordination, but is open to lay men and women alike.

So, while the term "acolyte" and the ceremonies surrounding it might seem strange or outdated, the Church keeps these practices in place order to help preserve our reverence for the Body and Blood of Jesus in the Eucharist. The ceremony with which we approach the Blessed Sacrament (and the training that goes with it) is a sign that we are not dealing with ordinary realities. In the Eucharist we truly encounter the *real presence* of our Lord! - Br. Anthony



St. Martin de Porres Blessing of the Animals

SATURDAY, Nov. 5 AT 9:30 AM OUTSIDE THE CHURCH


This year at St. Raymond's we'll be doing the Blessing of the Animals on November 5th, the Feast of St. Martin

de Porres, OP, at 9:30am in the Church parking lot.

St. Martin was the first black saint from the Americas and stands for interracial and social justice and racial harmony. He was a surgeon and is known for his miraculous cures, for both people and animals! He was a 16th century Dr. Doolittle, with the ability to communicate with animals. Like St. Francis, Martin treated animals as if they were brothers and sisters. He treated sick and wounded cats and dogs at his animal hospital set up as one of the first veterinary clinics. He also founded a shelter for stray pets.

One particularly famous story of St. Martin had to do with a mischief of mice who took up residence in a Dominican priory. The other friars wanted to poison the furry invaders, but St. Martin had other plans. Reminiscent of St. Francis' negotiations with the wolf of Gubio, St. Martin promised to keep the mice safe if they would relocate to a little den at the end of the garden and never enter the priory again. In return, St. Martin promised to cater their meals. The mice promptly followed St. Martin out to the garden, St. Martin regularly fed them, and all lived happily ever after.

So, bring your pets to be blessed on November 5th at 9:30am. St. Martin, pray for us!

Don't you love the fall colors, signs of change, crisp air? What part of God's created world has filled you with wonder and awe, gratitude and joy? How has that encounter moved you to a deeper

Rather, fulfilling this responsibility accords with a faith-filled life in line with Jesus' mission:

In the absence of pressure from the public and from civic institutions, political authorities will always be reluctant to intervene, all the more when urgent needs must be met.... A healthy politics is sorely needed, capable of reforming and coordinating institutions, promoting best practices and overcoming undue pressure and bureaucratic inertia. (*Laudato Si'* 181)

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


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
