



#### WE HAVE COME TO DO HIM HOMAGE

Weekly Gospel Reflection (Mt 2:1-12)

In our world, we could say that creatures are like "words from God".

All creatures—rocks, plants, animals, men, angels—each of them reveals something of God.

And you as well! You are a beautiful word from God—a word from God that says something of His heart.

It's beautiful, isn't it?

Well, within our world, the God-child became the most beautiful word from God. Jesus is the most beautiful word from God.

Notice that the Incarnation was announced differently to different people. To the shepherds God sends angels to appear to them, but to the Magi He sends a star.

It's a very special star—a star that is visible by night and day. A star that moves, that stops, that moves again. A star that descends very close to the ground to indicate where the God-child is.

God made a star just for the Magi. The star was a word from God to prepare the hearts of the Magi and to guide them to the One who is the Light. The Magi saw the child and they recognized God.

Yes, truly, this star was the word the Magi needed to hear, to be led to Jesus.

And this is what the feast of the Epiphany is all about. It is the feast of the Revelation of God—the feast of the

He already spoke to your heart, and he will continue to do so.


He has already chosen the most suitable way to do so, because He's the one who made you, and because He knows you better than you know yourself.

# Sculptures of St. Raymond

From a description at the time of the church's construction in the late 1950's. Some text has been edited for clarity.

The construction of St. Raymond Church was completed in October 1959 and dedicated on November 29, 1959. One of the uncompleted items in the Church design was the placement of two cultural bar-relief plaques over the two front exterior entrances depicting the work and episode in the life of St. Raymond of Penafort (d. 1275), the patron saint of the Church.

Each plaque is approximately  $6 \times 6$  feet in area and was executed in reinforced lightweight concrete by the prominent Bay Area sculptor Elio Benvenuto of San Francisco.

The plaque over the west entrance depicts two raised upright hands, one male and one female, with broken links of chains hanging from the slavery of the galleys and bondage. The shackles also signify the sin broken in absolution. The large upright key centrally located signifies "the power of the keys" given by Christ for the forgiveness of sins. The bookbinding at the base signifies St. Raymond's codification of Church laws in the 13th century, a code that served the church until 1918.

St. Raymond was the principal confessor of Rome, a canon lawyer, and a humanitarian who helped establish a religious order (with St. Peter Nolasco) to ransom the galley slaves of his period. (Today, in 2025, the order is named the Order of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Mercy, or the Mercedarian Friars).

The plaque over the east entrance depicts a heroic episode in the eventful life of the saint. He sailed from Barcelona to Mallorca to bring an adulterous king to his senses. In reprisal, the angry king forbade any vessel to take St. Raymond back to the mainland. Marooned on the shore, he used his voluminous Domanican cappa/cloak as a sail and placed his walking staff against his body making a miniature mast, simulating a sailing ship. He reached the mainland covering a distance of 160 miles in 6 hours, so history relates.

This voyage is symbolized by the flash of a wave under the upright figure with a full-blown cappa.

The design and symbolism were worked out in close collaboration between the sculptor and the pastor of St. Raymond, the Rt. Rev. Edwin  ${\sf J.}$ 

Kennedy. The execution and placement of the sculpture were done with close coordination



between the sculptor and Henry V. Chescoe of San Francisco, the architect of the Church.



As we begin 2025, let us remember to pray often Pope Francis' Prayer for the Earth from his encyclical, Laudato Si'.

All-powerful God, you are present in the whole universe and in the smallest of your creatures. You embrace with your tenderness all that exists. Pour out upon us the power of your love, that we may protect life and beauty. Fill us with peace, that we may live as brothers and sisters, harming no one.

O God of the poor, help us to rescue the abandoned and forgotten of this earth, so precious in your eyes. Bring healing to our lives, that we may protect the world and not prey on it, that we may sow beauty, not pollution and destruction. Touch the hearts of those who look only for gain at the expense of the poor and the earth.

Teach us to discover the worth of each thing; to be filled with awe and contemplation, to recognize that we are profoundly united with every creature as we journey towards your infinite light.


